





Scottsbluff High School, in partnership with the SBPS Foundation held it's second annual CTE Breakfast in April. This event is free and open to the public. Attendees enjoy a breakfast catered by SHS students and a report from each Career and Technical Student Organization.

Scottsbluff High School has 7 different Career and Technical Service Organizations (CTSO's). Each one corresponding to a different career academy: **DECA**- Business, Marketing, and Management, **Skills USA** - Skilled and Tech Science, **FFA** - Ag, Food, And Natural Resources, **ProStart** - Culinary, **Ed Rising** and **FCCLA** - Education and Human Services, and **HOSA** - Health Sciences.

There are many benefits for students who participate in a CTSO. First and foremost, they are able to apply their academic and technical learning in real life situations while discovering their individual strengths and talents. Each organization holds competitions at the state and national level where the students are able to compete with the best of the best in their chosen field. This enhances student performance and in many cases helps students discover their career.
